LGBTQ Clinical Certification PROGRAM INFORMATION

LGBTQ Clinical Certification

GLAP's Clinical Certification is the first psychoanalytic program of its kind. It is an exciting opportunity for all clinicians who seek specialized training in the treatment of the LGBTQ population of the 21st century. Therapists who complete 6 learning modules over 2 or more years, in conjunction with weekly supervision and the fulfillment of at least 3 fee-for-service patient hours per week, are eligible for LGBTQ Clinical Certification. Therapists in the certification program will receive group supervision; fee-for-service payment; reduced rates to other ICP seminars and workshops; invaluable networking connections; and the opportunity for private patient referral.

Continuing Clinical Education

All LGBTQ Clinical Certificate modules are open to clinicians seeking to expand their practical knowledge in working with the LGBTQ population. Completion of modules and qualifying seminars or conferences can be credited to fulfill the certificate program requirements. To meet the needs of clinicians with limited clinical experience with the LGBTQ population the programs offers **LGBTQ Clinical Foundations Module**.

Program Fees

- \$75 Application Fee
- \$200 per 6-9 hour module for certification candidates
- \$275 per 6-9 hour module for ICP candidates/members
- \$300 per 6-9 hour module for outside clinician

Didactic Requirements

Satisfactory completion of a minimum of 6 modules. One module must be **LGBTQ Clinical Foundations**.

LGBTQ Clinical Foundations Module

The purpose of this module is to provide clinicians with a foundation of knowledge for working with the LGBTQ population (e.g., coming out, internalized homophobia, sexual roles, couples, families, life stage issues, abuse, violence, health and substance abuse).

Module: LGBTQ focused Modules, Seminars, or Conferences that address specific disorders, clinical issues, populations, and modalities.

Supervision and Clinical Requirements:

- 3 patient hours a week.
- Group supervision once a week.
- Satisfactory evaluation by the supervisor.

LGBTQ Clinical Certification Program Questions and Answers

1. What is GLAP?

Gay and Lesbian Affirmative Psychotherapy (GLAP) is a division of **The Institute for Contemporary Psychotherapy (ICP)**. GLAP was founded in 1997 with a two-fold mission: to offer affordable, affirmative psychoanalytic psychotherapy to members of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Queer (LGBTQ) community; and to sensitize and educate mental health professionals providing treatment. We have succeeded on both fronts. While GLAP has made an incalculable difference in the lives of LGBTQ New Yorkers, we have continued to improve the quality of mental health services available to these individuals by training gay affirmative psychotherapists in weekly case supervision with master clinicians.

2. What is the LGBTQ Clinical Certificate Program?

GLAP's Clinical Certification is the first psychoanalytic program of its kind. It is an exciting opportunity for clinicians who seek specialized training in the treatment of the LGBTQ population. The program's goal is to expand GLAP's work in keeping mental health professionals informed and on the cutting edge of treatment and trends within the LGBTQ population. Our program is designed to provide a series of diverse didactic clinical practice modules, clinical practice, supervision, seminars and conference leading to a LGBTQ Clinical Certificate.

3. How do I apply?

4. How much time do I have to complete training?

The program is designed to permit clinicians to complete the program in two to three years. Candidates have 3 years to complete didactic requirements and two years to complete a minimum of 80 hours of supervised clinical practice with three patients.

5. When and where are modules, seminars and supervision provided?

A minimum of one module is offered every season. Seminars and conferences are held annually. These components may be held during the day, evening or on weekends. Training components are held at GLAP headquarters, instructors' offices, or designated venues depending on the number of participants. For a schedule of training components visit our website: www.glapnyc.org. Supervision is conducted for 90 minutes once a week at the supervisor's office.

6. Do I need to have experience working with the LGBTQ Population to participate?

Although some experience is preferred, it is not required. The program offers an LGBTQ Foundation Module.

7. If I apply for the certificate program after attending modules, can I get credit on what I have completed?

Yes. All LGBTQ Clinical Certificate components successfully completed before application and acceptance to the program can be credited to program. To ensure receiving credit, request an LGBTQ Certificate of Attendance upon successful completion of modules and qualifying Seminars or Conferences to submit with your program application.
